## NORTHEAST EXTENSION DIRECTORS' AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

#### REQUEST FOR APPLICATIONS

The Northeast Extension Award of Excellence in Extension is presented annually to an individual, multidisciplinary team, or integrated Extension/Research Program who has strived to achieve the benchmarks reflective of excellence in Extension educational programming. These include, but are not limited to, demonstration of high impact of programs; visionary leadership and anticipation of emerging issues for clientele and the system; commitment to diversity; and integration of programs in partnerships with university colleagues and outside clientele. Successful award recipient(s) should be recognized as a university leader and in their respective field of expertise, garner a continual flow of resources for sustainable Extension programs, use innovative teaching methods and be recognized by peers and the communities served. Preference will be given to multi-state programming.

The AWARD OF EXCELLENCE may be given annually to recognize up to three programs, that have achieved outstanding accomplishments, results and impacts in addressing contemporary issues in one or more of the 13 Northeast states. An Honorable Mention award(s) may be granted, if deemed warranted by the review committee.

The nominee must be an active Cooperative Extension System (CFS) professional (state, regional and/or county) with at least 50 percent FTE Extension appointment (Administrative FTE in these areas do not qualify a nominee), and have responsibility for Extension programming for five concurrent years. Anyone may recommend potential awardees by completing and submitting an application package. Self-nominations are appropriate. All applications require the signature of the Extension Director/1890Administrator and supervisor to be accepted for consideration. Only one nomination per institution will be accepted for consideration. Applications will be managed, reviewed, rated and recommended for the *Award of Excellence* by the Northeast Directors' Recognition Committee.

The Award of Excellence will be presented to the recipient(s) by the Chair of the Northeast Extension Directors (NEED) during the joint summer meeting. The Award of Excellence includes a plaque, certificate and a monetary stipend in support of the program. The recipient(s) will have an opportunity to give a brief seminar at the time of the award presentation.

**NOMINATION PACKAGE GUIDELINES** Only electronic submissions as a Word File email attachments will be accepted. Use Times New Roman 12 point (or equivalent) type on all documents.

Information to include in nominations:

- Name, title, address, phone number and email address of nominee or team
- Nominator information (name, title, address, phone number and email address)
- Nominee's or team's background information including nominee's or team's education and experience to justify award selection.
- Documented evidence to be used against the evaluation criteria shown below

#### ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION (not counted as part of the 6 page limit)

- o Nominee's Curriculum Vita
- o Signature approval for submission by the nominee's Dean/Director/1890 Administrator and supervisor.
- o Endorsement statements from an administrator, a former program participant, a colleague, etc. (no more than 3)
- o Abstract no more than 150 words
- o Specific wording for award citation (15 words or less)

Demonstrated high impact of Extension focus research-based programs; anticipated and responded to critical public needs with solutions on critical issues. Enhanced the public good indicated by economic, social and/or environmental impact at state, regional and/or multi-state level.

## SCHOLARLY PRODUCTS DEVELOPED AND CONTRIBUTION TO FIELD OF EXPERTISE

Recognized excellence in one's field of expertise as demonstrated by sustained external funding, awards, recognition, and request for regional/state/national addresses and speaking engagements; and appropriate, peer reviewed publication of scholarly work, including journal articles.

#### Each application must include information, as presented above:

- A complete nomination package consists of the information needed to describe the basis for nomination, addressing the six evaluation criteria outlined, not to exceed 6 total numbered pages.
- Incomplete applications or applications in excess of six pages will not be reviewed.
- Application must include the Cover Page as formatted on Page 4.

#### Cooperative Extension Regional Scan for ECOP Northeast Extension Directors (NEED) March 2013

#### Critical Issues

- "Building a Sustainable Funding Model for Cooperative Extension" was the theme for the March 18, 2013 NEED Winter Meeting held in conjunction with the National Extension Directors and Administrators Meeting. The evidence is overwhelming that the current funding model will not sustain Extension within the Northeast Region. Directors examined a number of options after all reading The Business Model Innovative Factory: How to Stay Relevant When the World is Changing by Saul Kaplan. How can Cooperative Extension, as a System, address this challenge?
- What started as a NE states response to the Affordable Care Act has become a multi-state, multi-region Extension team focused on Health Insurance Literacy. The team is currently working together to fill a demand for understanding, learning, and establishing a body of knowledge and educational programming related to health reform and specifically health insurance literacy. Not only will our programming people respond knowledgeably, but also it will position Extension and the land-grant system as a leader in addressing this compelling public policy issue. The team will be presenting a pre-conference workshop at the April Extension Priester Health Conference and inviting colleagues to be a part of the initiative.
- Extreme weather patterns have caused much damage over the past two years from flooding in southern Vermont to Hurricane Sandy's devastation in several Northeast states. How can the land-grant system help to mitigate these events when already fiscally challenged?

#### Other Items:

- NEED and NERA approved the first joint mini planning grants focused on Food Systems in the Northeast with a goal of more success in the competitive grant arena.
- Twelve of the sixteen Northeast institutions now have development officers for Extension. They
  are meeting together on an as needed basis with the next meeting on March 27, 2013.
- Increased communication within the region through development of Program Leaders Network is leading to improved communication/collaboration across institutional/state lines.

#### **Personnel Changes**

NEED has welcomed Mike O'Neill, as Associate Dean and Associate Director, at the University of Connecticut. He began the position November 2012.
